Composer Notes

Psalm 63 is classified as an individual lament, though Rowinckel sees it as a “royal” psalm (after the pattern of Psalm 61). The complete psalm has four sections: 1) a poetic evocation of the yearning to be with God (vss. 2–3), 2) a description of what the Temple service means to the psalmist (vss. 4–9), 3) imprecations against enemies (vss. 10–11), and 4) a prayer for the king and the faithful (vs. 12). Only the first two sections of the text appear in my setting.

Psalm 63 is one of the privileged “morning” psalms associated with Lauds. The Latin Psalter added “from dawn/early morning” to the phrase “for you my soul is thirsting” which became the basis of considering this as a “morning psalm” as well as the mention of “musing on God through the night”). It is appointed in the Roman Liturgy of Hours for Sunday I Morning Prayer (which is also the festival form for Lauds). In addition, it appears often in the Lectionary for Mass, most notably as a Common Responsorial Psalm for the Season of the Year with the antiphon “My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.” My antiphon, taken from Psalm 130, emphasizes the advental and eschatological character of the opening section of the psalm.

The psalm-setting is one of great simplicity, almost austerity. The refrain is measured and dignified while the verses are sung in free chant, speech rhythm. The accompaniment may be keyboard (organ/piano) or harp.
